> Feb 16, 1949 - Dec 29, 1949. The file primarily contains letters from constituents regarding policies of the Department of Agriculture. Some of the letters request that the Department of Agriculture raise price supports on such things as dairy products and Angora rabbits. Others simply request information about such items as loans, the Housing Act of 1949 and boll weevil control.

F3. BCN 26 F3 [Department of] Agriculture [Miscellaneous Correspondence] 1949-1951.

Oct 8, 1949 - Oct 13, 1950.

The file contains letters from constituents concerning various agricultural problems they are experiencing. Among these problems are: the need for federal aid to share croppers; the need of a rice grading station in DeWitt; cotton acreage allotment; and the boll weevil. There is also correspondence concerning an attempt by the state hospital to obtain surplus butter.

The file contains letters from constituents relating to several agricultural matters. Senator Fulbright's correspondence with Secretary of Agriculture Brannan to obtain the requested information or to relate the mood of the constituents is contained in the file. The Senator's replies to constituents are also contained.

The file contains correspondence concerning several of the Department of Agriculture's cotton policies in 1946. There is also correspondence concerning the need for an increased ceiling price on cotton linters as well as correspondence concerned with the falling price of raw cotton. Aug 19, 1946 - Aug 4, 1947.

The file contains correspondence concerning the Department of Agriculture's sugar rationing policies. The letters from constituents can he divided into two classes: letters from homemakers and letters from industrial users. All letters state opposition to sugar rationing. Of special interest is the attempt of a soft drink bottler to have his sugar allotment increased. A memo from the C and H sugar company is also contained in the file.

Oct 1943 - Feb 28, 1945. The file contains letters from constituents concerning several agriculture matters. A large number of letters concern the alleged political activities of an Agriculture Adjustment Agency employee in Madison County. Another group of letters concern allegations that the Agriculture Extension Service in Arkansas is not cooperating with other agricultural agencies. There are letters complaining about the fact that the Agricultural Adjustment Agency declared void an election to fill the Madison County Committee of the A.A.A. A personal letter from Haco Boyd is also contained in the file.

The file contains letters from constituents concerning agricultural matters. Typical of these letters are those that state the need for more farm implements in Arkansas. Other examples would be as follows: letters requesting that the Department of Agriculture raise the price supports on Irish potatoes; letters complaining that the Department exploits temporary cotton classers and; letters protesting a proposed ban on cloth print grain bags. Letters commending the appointment of Clinton Presba Anderson as Secretary of Agriculture are also contained in the file.

F9. ECN 26 FQ [9 Department of Agriculture-Miscellaneous Correspondence] Feb 28, 1945 - Dec 17, 1945

The file contains correspondence concerning agricultural matters. Typical of these letters are those written to protest changing of loan agreement for cotton from net weight to gross weight, and to protest the feeder subsidy program for cattle. Other correspondence concerns: the proposed liquidation of the migratory labor camps; attempts to have two canneries in Springdale presented an "A" Award from the War Food Administration for outstanding contribution to the war effort; a request for a subsidy to the Flippin Canning Company and; suggestions for appointment of Director for the State A.A.A. Committee. Also contained in the file is a resolution of Northwest Arkansas farmers and a diagram of the proposed reorganization of the Department of Agricluture farm program in Searcy and Van Buren counties.

Oct. 25, 1945 - Mar 29, 1946.

The file contains correspondence regarding agricultural matters. A large number of letters concern the shortage of feed for poultry and livestock as this shortage relates to War Food Order No. 9. Other correspondence concerns requests for a governmental program for supporting the price of dairy products, for an allocation of cotton for storage in the Waldo Bonded Warehouse, for a sale of some government land in Montgomery County, Arkansas and for information pertaining to Forest Service employment of pilots. Also contained in the file are copies of the following: a text of a radio broadcast protesting government laxity in controlling sources of protein feed; a statement of condition of the Federal Land Bank in St. Louis; a report by Professor Barnett Sure concerning "Food Yeasts and Soybeans in Relation to World Nutrition" and; War Food Orders 9 and 9-19.

Other letters request that some prisoners of war be allowed to continue their labor in Arkansas; that the Agriculture Department increase the pay for county agriculture office personnel and; that War Food Order 145 be rescinded. Also contained in the file is: a list of the Famine Emergency Committee Recommendations; a War Food Administration "Application for Payment for Designated Canned Foods" filled out by Mrs. Hattie Roberts, owner of the Roberts Canning Company; and a copy of Senate Bill 2119.

April 29, 1946 - Sept 15. 1947.

The file contains correspondence pertaining to a wide range of agricultural matters. Also contained in the file is an article by Professor Barnett Sure entitled "Biological Value of Food Yeast Proteins and Their Role as Supplements to the Proteins of the Cereal Grains." For example, there are letters from constituents concerning the following: the securing of subsidy payments for livestock; protest of the potato destruction in Alabama; importation of Shetland Ponies; protest of the rice purchase program of the Department of Agriculture; the Commodity Credit Corporation's policy regarding the purchase of wheat for shipment abroad; the purchase of the Migratory Farm Labor Camp by the Springdale School Board; the purchase, by private citizens, of Federally owned conservation land around Forrest City and; opposition to the raising of import quotas on long staple cotton. The file also contains a list of tomato growers around Zinc, Arkansas. F16. BCN 26 F16 [9 Department of] Agriculture-Rice Production. July 5, 1945-April 3, 1946.

> The file contains correspondence protesting the proposed increase In allocations of rice for relief export shipment and reducing assessments to brewers, processors and manufacturers of food products in this country. Such correspondence came from J.W. Recker, the Producers Rice Mill, Inc. and Mr. Fred Ahrent, President of the Clay County Farm Bureau. There is also correspondence from Al F. Meehan requesting that the Cyanamede Company give preference to rice in its allocations.

F17. BCN 26 F17 [9 Department of Agriculture] Arkansas Central Cooperative Cotton Classification, etc.

Feb 17, 1945-Mar 12, 1945. The file contains two letters from Mr. Charles E. Henry of the Mid South Cotton Growers Association to Senator Fulbright denying accusations made by the Arkansas Central Cooperative Association that Mid South was underclassing cotton in order to buy it from farmers at a low price. A letter to Congressman Fadjo Cravens regarding the same matter is also included.

Oct 12, 1949-Mar 15, 1950.

The file contains correspondence regarding delivery of electric service in Arkansas. Some of the letters pertain to attempts to get electric service for Jacksonville from the REA. There are also copies of letters from the Arkansas Power and Light Company to various electric coops concerning proposed rate hikes. However, the great majority of the correspondence is in protest to a proposed loan from the Rural Electrification Administration to the Southwestern Power Administration with which to build generating and transmission facilities in Western Arkansas.

ov F21 BCN 26 F21 [Department of Agriculture] Rural Electrification Administration 1949-1951.

Mar 13, 1950-Dec 11, 1951. The file contains correspondence relating to activities, both proposed and actual, of the Rural Electrification Administration. There is a continuation of the letters of protest concerning the proposed loan from the REA to the Southwestern Power Administration. Other typical correspondence is as follows: a copy of a lengthy letter from Congressman Boyd Tackett concerning exorbitant fees paid by the REA to engineers and attorneys; a reply to this letter from Clyde T. Ellis, executive director of the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association; a resolution of the NRECA condemning attempts by private power to undermine REA programs; correspondence armed at obtaining payment for the construction of transmission towers from the Codington-Clark Electric Cooperative, Inc. in South Dakota to the Delta Construction Company in Clarksdale, Mississippi; Several requests for information about the construction of rural telephone facilities financed by the REA; requests for assistance in getting a guest speaker from the REA to speak to the South Central Arkansas Electric Cooperative and; requests for assistance in obtaining rural electric service.

F22 BCN 26 F22 [9 Department of Agriculture] Rural Electrification Administration 1949-1951.

Aug 25, 1950-Dec 11, 1951.

The file contains correspondence pertaining to various activities that came under the auspices of the Rural Electrification Administration. There is a good deal of correspondence concerning the loan eventually made by the REA to the Arkansas Electric Cooperative Cooperation with which to build generating and transmission facilities in Northwest Arkansas. A copy of the Arkansas Public Service Commission hearings on the Cooperative's proposal to build the facilities is also included in the file. Other typical correspondence relates to the following: a dispute over payment of \$12,000 from M&A Electric Cooperative to Delta Construction Company; the difficulty experienced by some constituents in obtaining REA services; protests to the proposal that would require Defense Electric Power Administration approval of every electric cooperative's construction plans and; the extent of REA involvement in the area of rural telephone service.

Nov 18, 1944-June 3, 1947

The file contains correspondence pertaining to various activities that came under the auspices of the Rural Electrification Administration. The two largest areas of correspondence pertain to the following: constituent requests for assistance in obtaining rural electric service and the appointment of a new REA Administrator. Most of the letters in the latter category recommend William Joseph Neal for the post. There is also a copy of a letter from Arkansas Power and Light President Colter Hamilton Moses to T.E. Bostick, Manager of the Woodruff Electric Cooperative, offering alternatives to the proposed rate charged the Coops by AP&L. Supportive material includes: a resolution of the Texarkana Electrical Dealers Association protesting the sale of electrical appliances by coops; a resolution of the Baxter County Farm Bureau supporting Congressional appropriations for the REA and; the Arkansas Power and Light Company yearly report concerning the construction of rural electrical lines for 1946.

July 7, 1947-Dec 7, 1949

The file contains correspondence pertaining to various activities that came under the auspices of the Rural Electrification Administration. The overwhelming amount of correspondence concerns requests from constituents for assistance in obtaining electric service from their co-ops. Other correspondence includes a letter from a constituent inquiring whether the proper procedure was used in the election of officers for the Southwest Arkansas Electric Cooperative Corporation and a reply to an inquiry by Roy H. Parks, editor of "Coop Power" magazine, indicating that Senator Fulbright does favor 100% completion of the rural electrification program. Supplementary material includes several monthly statistical bulletins published by the REA and a record of energized farms in Arkansas as of December 31, 1948.

The first group contains correspondence aimed at having various counties in Arkansas declared disaster areas by the FHA as a result of insect infestation and flooding of crops. The second group contains requests for assistance in receiving loans after the counties had been declared disaster areas. The third group contains requests for information regarding a directive in which the Administration of the FHA discontinued the refinancing phase of the disaster loan program, Also included in this group are letters of protest over the action. Supplementary material includes the following: instructions from FHA State Director Lester Virgil Highfill to County Supervisors concerning the proper procedure of obtaining information to be used in determining disaster loan areas; a resolution of the Pulaski County Farm Bureau favoring the making of disaster loans available and; a lengthy letter from Dillard Brown Lasseter, Administrator of the FHA, indicating which counties in Arkansas had been designated as disaster areas. The letter also outlined the procedure for obtaining loans.

Supplementary material includes: a list of Montgomery County residents who urge a reasonable program of land sales by the Forest Service; a National Parks Payment Bonus released by the Ouachita and Ozark National Forests and; <u>Facts and Figures</u> for fiscal year 1947 concerning the National Forests.
