#### BCN 89. General description.

Files 1 through 7 contain materials and correspondence on the Natural Gas Act, a bill to exempt independent natural gas producers from direct federal price regulation. While most of the correspondence expresses opposition to JWF's support of the gas bill, File 6 contains favorable correspondence representing different groups interested in the passage of the bill. JWF responses, while largely routine, are somewhat extensive at times as he attempts to explain the bill. Subjects found frequently throughout the files include: lobby influence, Francis Higbee Case, campaign contributions, mass media, Oren Harris, and the oil industry.

Files 8-26 include letters from beneficiaries of student exchange programs as well as applicants for same. Although there are a few constituent letters, most are out-of-state. Found generally throughout the files are requests for various types of financial assistance as well as requests for particular types of information concerning the exchange program and letters of appreciation from recipients of scholarships. JWF responses include forwarding inquiries and requests to proper channels and relaying information concerning the application for awards under the exchange program. JWF correspondence includes also efforts to marshal support for the program with letters to various influential persons. Subjects include a variety of nations involved (especially India and Greece), education, the Bricker Amendment, and the Natural Gas Act. Frequent correspondents include: Francis James Colligan, Russell Lowell Riley, and Thruston Ballard Morton. These correspondents handled the mail forwarded by JWF to their department for more thorough replies concerning educational exchange; and coordinated responses to proper channels.

#### BCN 90. Research Material – 1954 [sic]

General description.

BCN 90 contains primarily research material, including printed and typed reports, copies of bills, statements of significant persons concerning particular subjects, reports on bills, printed copies of committee hearings, statistical materials –tables and charts --pamphlets, proposed amendments, magazine articles, and newspaper clippings. Also included are drafts of JWF speeches. There are a few significant correspondents, but very little correspondence.

Found generally throughout the BCN are materials concerning the proposed reorganization of the international information and educational exchange programs and eventual incorporation of information activities into a new agency; and materials concerning educational exchange, including concern for administrative location of program and efforts to exempt certain of the scholarship programs from budgetary reform. Also included are materials concerning ownership of the submerged lands of the marginal sea, misnamed "tidelands", and legal background of the controversy. Other subjects include: reciprocal trade, sugar legislation, and foreign relations.

There is some duplication of materials within a single file, and, at times, same material may appear in two or more files.
