PROCESSING HIGHLIGHTS

The department is honored to be the repository for Crescent Dragonwagon's archival collection. Ms. Dragonwagon's career includes writing over 20 children's books, two novels, seven cookbooks and culinary memoirs, as well as a book of poetry, and a biography of Stevie Wonder. No stranger to Northwest Arkansas where she lived for nearly twenty years and operated the Dairy Hollow House, an inn and restaurant in Eureka Springs, Ms. Dragonwagon returned full-time to the area in 2018. Processing her collection is the department's Assistant Head, Melanie Griffin. Dr. Griffin's PhD in literacy studies with a concentration in children's literature enables her to bring that expertise and experience to her work with this collection:

"The Crescent Dragonwagon Papers are such a delight to work with and make available for research and teaching use. My favorite discovery so far has been the ingenious methods Ms. Dragonwagon used as she revised her book manuscripts. The first draft is almost always a typescript, and later revisions have collage-type edits, with sections or sentences cut out and moved to another section of the page and handwritten additions layered on top of the collage. The collection provides a fascinating glimpse into the creative process."

We anticipate opening this collection for research in 2020.



Central to our work to support undergraduate education, the Department collaborated with Professor Josh Smith and his Honors College Signature Seminar manuscript class to co-develop an assignment that asked students to write a proposal justifying the purchase of specific manuscripts available on the market that would support scholarly inquiry. The most compelling proposal was submitted by honors creative writing and classical studies sophomore, Claire Hutchinson. The result was the purchase of three new manuscripts that fill gaps in our collection.

Seeking to provide our graduate students with a professional development opportunity and a space to develop a scholarly community on campus, the Department began its **Graduate Student Speaker Series.** Over the course of the year, six different students presented their research in this colloquium setting. Topics ranged from religious conservatism, to the use of pesticides, to food culture.

This series continues in fall 2019.

Presented in front of over 100 attendees, the event coincided with an exhibit curated by the librarian-in-residence, Marianne Williams.





Spotlight FOCUS ON FULBRIGHT

It has been an active year involving all things Fulbright related!

In November, we participated in the Fulbright Foreign Scholarship Board's meeting in Fayetteville, and introduced board members to items in these rich archival collections. Our successful collaboration with partners in Fulbright College enabled us to use funding from a Chancellor's Grant to hire a graduate student who processed 5 new collections now open for research, as well as enhanced the discoverability of two other Fulbright-related collections. On the collection development end, Dr. Birrell was invited by the State Department to give a presentation to visiting Fulbright commissioners as part of their annual meeting in Washington, D.C. This presentation invited them to consider the UofA as a possible repository for their historical records. As part of the commissioners' time in the US in May, a number visited campus and had the opportunity to view items from the collection as part of the "Building Bridges: The Fulbright Legacy and the Future of International Exchange," conference, which was hosted by the University of Arkansas International and Global Studies Program and Office of Study Abroad.

DIGITAL **PROJECTS**

The University Archives has begun a number of projects in anticipation of the University's 150th anniversary in 2021, including one to make freely available online the Arkansas Traveler student newspaper. Launched in April, the University Libraries have digitized the first issues of the newspaper from 1907 to 1947. The collection is now searchable online. In the coming months, subsequent issues will be published, with all issues available online by 2021.


